


This illustrated art book showcases 100 masterpieces that present the legacy of culture, history, and beauty that the popes have stewarded for centuries.


The Vatican Museums are a complex of diverse

From the Desk of Fr. Eric: When, When, WHEN?

Dear friends.

It is my honor to introduce to you for the first time in The Voice: Paulist Fr. Paolo Leonardo Puccini!

Fr. Paolo was ordained a priest at St. Austin Catholic Parish in Austin, TX, on Saturday, July 25, 2020. His Mass of Thanksgiving ("First Mass") was held on Sunday, July 26, also at St. Austin's, a parish served by our missionary society since 1908.

Is there any question that the musical number we Paulists decided to perform for Fr. Paolo at his virtual ordination reception that Saturday night would be a version of the 1962 pop song "Quando, Quando, Quando?" ("When, When, When?")

"When" is the dominant question to so many parts of life during the COVID-19 pandemic. When will it be safe for people to gather indoors? When will it be safe to go back to school? And, in Fr. Paolo's case, when will there be the ordination?

Fr. Paolo's patience, humility, and trust were exemplary since the moment his ordination, originally scheduled for May at the Church of St. Paul the Apostle in New York City, was postponed. Austin was chosen as the replacement location so that Fr. Paolo's immediate family in Houston could travel by car to attend. But, even in Austin, there was even concern up to the last moment due to the high number of COVID-19 cases in Texas.

Usually, Paulist Fathers from all over the country travel to our Ordination Masses to show

support. But, this year, it was only prudent for just one out-of-town Paulist to make the trip: Paulist Fr. Evan Cummings, Fr. Paolo's seminary classmate and our 2019 ordinand. Fortunately, the six Paulist Fathers who live in our Austin rectory and Paulist Fr. Ruben Patiño of nearby Horseshoe Bay, TX, were able to take part in the Ordination Mass.

But, even though relatively few people could be physically present in the church on July 25 and July 26, thousands of people were able participate via our live, television-quality broadcasts of both the Ordination Mass and First Mass. We were especially pleased to

be able to provide the broadcasts for Fr. Paolo's family members in Colombia (including his grandmother) and in Italy.



Mindful of the personal losses suffered by so many during the pandemic, the campaign has been on pause since the spring. But, as the "new normal" of 2020 has settled in, we are restarting this important effort.

Remembering Regis Philbin

Famed television host Regis Philbin entered eternal life on July 24, 2020, at the age of 88. Regis was baptized at our mother church, the Church of St. Paul the Apostle in New York City.

We have fond memories of the night in December, 2013, when Regis proclaimed

the Scripture passages during "A New York Christmas to Remember" at St. Paul's. It was an evening of carols, puppetry and more that was broadcast on CBS on Christmas Eve that year.

That night, after Regis was introduced, he said:

I just wanted to tell you how happy I am to be able do this tonight. You know, my mother was born on 59th Street and this was her Church. And, all through her life, even though we moved away, she would say to me, 'Those Paulist priests were the best we ever met.' And she loved them all very much. Just for your information, I was baptized in that font back there. I couldn't get in it tonight but I took a good, long look at it.
