



# Happy 200th Birthday, Fr. Hecker!



For the past year, we have been celebrating the 200th anniversary of the birth of Servant of God Isaac Hecker, a son of German immigrants born in New York City on December 18, 1819.

The bicentennial year has been a blessed opportunity to recall the writings and the spirituality of Fr. Hecker, who founded the Paulist Fathers in 1858.

It also has been a chance to

refocus on the cause for Fr. Hecker's beatification and canonization as a saint. The cause was opened by New York's Cardinal Edward Egan in 2008.

Among scholars of Catholic history in the United States, Fr. Hecker is well known. His story also is told frequently at the parishes and centers served by the Paulists.

But, for Fr. Hecker to be canonized, more people likely will need to learn about this dynamic priest's journey of conversion into the Church — and his drive to "make America Catholic."

Fr. Hecker would be a patron saint for all those who struggle with faith, for those who work mightily to discern how the Holy Spirit is moving within them. He would be a patron of the seekers, the risk-takers and the misunderstood.

Fr. Hecker also would be a patron saint for those who suffer from blood cancers like leukemia, lymphoma and myeloma. It is believed Fr. Hecker died from a blood cancer when he entered eternal life on December 22, 1888.
