Stransky was a noted ecumenist and interfaith leader, having had a part in the creation of "Nostra Aetate," the groundbreaking Vatican II document on the Church's relations with the Jewish people and others who are not Christian.


New from Paulist Press

Donor Profile: Nelly Nigro

We pray in thanksgiving for the life and generosity of **Nelly Nigro** (1925 - 2017). This year, the Paulist Fathers received a bequest of \$219,000 from Ms. Nigro's estate.

She was a parishioner at St. Paul the Apostle Catholic Community in Los Angeles.

A native of Omaha, NE, Ms. Nigro was the daughter of immigrants from Sicily. In 1945, she earned a bachelor of science from the Creighton University School of Pharmacy.

She began work as a pharmacist when there were few women in the profession. She worked at multiple hospitals before moving to Los Angeles where, in 1955, she helped to open the UCLA Medical Center. She remained there for the rest of

After Ms. Nigro "retired," she earned her masters degree in public health in 1991 from the UCLA School of Public Health She worked there as a research assistant until 1994.

She loved to travel, visiting countries around the world and reaching all seven continents. She also was an avid skier.
